WHY A WORKSHOP?



An AA workshop is a meeting where a group of people engage in an in-depth, intensive discussion on a particular subject in Alcoholics Anonymous. Workshops are usually Step, Tradition, and /or Service based. They are opportunities to learn and discuss subjects on a deeper level than usually takes place at a regular meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. Workshops give the attendees an opportunity to listen, study, and engage in discussion about topics that may not be as familiar in the fellowship. Not all members have experience with certain subjects in AA. I did not have any experience with archives or Traditions. I had only read the Twelve Traditions off the window shade. I was not aware of the true meaning and principle behind each one. It was at my first ever workshop I attended that I first heard about the Traditions in depth. There were no members around in the district that I lived in that had any real experience with the Twelve Traditions or any in-depth service work. I lived in a dark district that had had no representation at the Area level for many years. We started asking people from the Area Committee to come and put on workshops in the district. They were happy and eager to come and join us. Not only did we all learn together, but we also had the opportunity to spend some time together and get to know the trusted servants in our Area who had an immense love for Alcoholics Anonymous. We had fun.

In late May, members of the Area Committee traveled to District 7 in Somerset and held a wonderful workshop. The workshop had a Local Welcome to Service (different than the Welcome to Service that is done on Saturday morning at the Area Meeting.) This presentation focuses on how an individual member can get involved locally. The workshop then had three different presentations on select Traditions. This was a great workshop that had over 100 members in attendance and lasted from 10AM-3PM.

In late June, Area 26 Delegate Jennifer J. and myself had an expedition to District 3 in Bowling Green. We talked about our service histories, and I did the presentation on Local Welcome to Service. There were over 50 people in attendance, and, in classic District 3 fashion, they had a dunking booth. I believe they dunked me about 15-20 times. Never forget that we are not a glum lot.

Workshops are excellent opportunities to rally a district or home group. The Area budgets money each year specifically for workshops. The Area Committee wants to come and visit your local

district. In my experience, these types of events are crucial for the unity and continued growth of a local AA community.

WHEN AMAZING THINGS HAPPEN



I have a regular meeting that I attend every Tuesday. It's about a 40-minute drive but I enjoy the people and the fact that they choose a reading and then discuss alcoholism. This week, due to challenging weather, I was unable to attend but decided to take the drive on Thursday. I had already completed my 11th step readings and felt compelled to go, even though I'd never joined them on Thursdays. When I walked into the room, I was surprised to find about 30 men with one woman who was chairing. Shortly after, a young man walked in inquiring whether this was AA; we all responded "Yes, have a seat". How It Works and the Twelve Traditions were read and a fellow with 9 years started sharing and the miracle developed. As each man talked, there arose a comradery that filled the room, speaking to the newcomer. Continuing around with the male perspective, I could feel an air of excitement that I hadn't felt before; this was truly the magic of the AA message. Bantering back and forth, the friends told humorous and serious bouts with alcohol. The meeting was unfolding exactly the way the Higher Power wanted with no female interaction. It was very moving, and I could see the face of the new man; he was hearing, and probably feeling, exactly what was needed. On my drive home, I thought about "a fellowship of men and women" and knew that explanation had been shown in that meeting; I don't believe the power would have been there with women also sharing. We do have to agree that they present their stories differently. I attend, many meetings both mixed and women only but, was thrilled that the Higher Power showed up exactly when he was needed. Grapevine – Annual Prison Issue

I am eternally grateful to AA and the ways it helped me restore some sanity back into my life. Growing up in an alcoholic family and community as I did was difficult. I was unable to see that the life I was living was anything but normal.

As a child, I naturally developed a deep love and admiration for my parents, especially my father. He was the definition of coolness, and despite his heavy drinking, I wanted to be exactly like him.

I had a lot of friends and we all glorified drinking. This prevented me from seeing the damaging effects alcohol was having on my life. Eventually, my drinking landed me in prison with a life sentence. It would be years before I would see and finally understand what alcohol, along with my messed-up attitude, really did to me.

After 24 years inside prison, I finally built up enough nerve to attend my first AA meeting. It was such a welcome change. Still, it would be weeks before I got up enough nerve to share my story with everyone. While I did enjoy hearing others tell their amazing stories, I felt too embarrassed to share mine.



I was very fortunate that the outside AA volunteers who brought meetings into the prison were so patient with me. In time, my moment of sharing came with a flood of tears. Up until that moment, I had never sat down and had a serious heart-to-heart talk with anyone. Did that mean no one ever cared about me? Did it mean that drinking had made me into some kind of Superman who didn't want or need love or compassion? No. Yet now I got to feel the love and family unity of my fellow AA members.

Today I no longer see myself as serving a sentence of life without parole in prison. Rather I'm now serving life without parole in AA. To me, that's time well spent. So far AA has brought so much love into my life that I may have developed a dependency on it. In fact, I wanted and

needed AA to be a part of my life so much that one day I protested when I was transferred from a prison with AA meetings to a prison without them. That didn't sit well with me. Fear immediately set in. I complained to the prison officials about not having an AA meeting and I requested to be transferred to a prison that had them.

My efforts didn't stop there. I also sent a letter to my old AA group saying that we didn't have any AA meetings at my current prison, and I asked for their support. Within weeks the prison officials began allowing an AA meeting inside. The proudest moment I've had since becoming a member of AA was when Jeff, the outside AA volunteer, told me he'd gotten my letter and that the group back at my old prison fully supported me. Now that's love! That's AA unity at its best.

Information from Jennifer Our Delegate:

- 1. The AA Grapevine Corporate Board will have a vacancy for the position of Non-Trustee Director following the General Service Conference in April 2024. The Board of Trustees has requested that the AA Grapevine Board's recommendation be presented for this position to the trustees' Nominating Committee for review at its January 2024 meeting. Since resumes need to be screened and applicants interviewed by members of our Corporate Board in a timely fashion, the process must begin well in advance. - 2. Annual deadline for agenda item submissions, for the General Service Conference, is September 15.

A recent reorganization at the General Service Office (GSO) to create two new departments Language Services and Legal, Licensing and Intellectual Property is bringing more focus to their important services, including the licensing of literature to AA structures around the world, new translations of books and pamphlets, translation of documents and background for the General Service Conference, and protecting intellectual property rights related to literature and the AA name.

- 6. We now have a separate post office box that has been established for Seventh Tradition contributions only. Please send contribution checks payable to "General Service Board" to: Post Office Box 2407 James A Farley Station New York, NY 10116-2407. This dedicated PO box enables us to process contributions much more efficiently and at a significant savings to the Fellowship. You also can continue to make contributions online at www.contribution.aa.org using a major credit card or PayPal.
- 7. This year marks the 60th anniversary of the first unabridged edition of the Big Book in French, which was officially released on March 2, 1963, in Montreal, Quebec, Canada.

- 8. As of April 3, 2023, prices will increase on English, Spanish, and French books, booklets, and pamphlets. The new pricelist is available at https://www.aa.org/pricelist-april-2023. The increase will be reflected on the online: bookstore at https://onlineliterature.aa.org

- 9. The trustees' Literature Committee has opened a call for recovery stories in response to the 2021 General Service Conference advisory action regarding the pamphlet "A.A. for the Native North American Alcoholic." The advisory action stated that the pamphlet be updated to include current stories of recovery and a new title that is respectful and inclusive. The committee is seeking stories of recovery from all Indigenous communities in the AA structure in the United States and Canada. Stories of recovery may include but are not limited to:
 - Experience, strength, and hope
 - Steps, Traditions, Concepts
 - Ethnic, cultural, gender and LGBTQ diversity
 - Diversity of social status
 - Sponsorship
 - AA service
 - Safety & amp; racism
 - Military
 - Sobriety and mental health
 - Experience in AA meetings
 - Atheist/Agnostics
 - Newcomer experiences
 - Cultural reconnection

The suggested format for typed manuscripts is 500-1,000 words, double-spaced, in 12-point font. Handwritten manuscripts should be approximately 5 to 8 pages. Please include your complete name, address, and email/phone information on the first page of your manuscript. A copy of your manuscript should be retained for your files. The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not.
