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When I came into the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous, at the age of 28, the idea of starting this whole new way of life seemed like the hardest concept imaginable. I was given literature, phone numbers, and what felt like a million suggestions from the people in these rooms. Those suggestions included things like: start calling other women, start going to meetings every day, start praying, start working the steps, start being grateful, start getting honest, and start being willing. I was at the lowest bottom I had ever experienced. I had been living in a state of perpetual chaos and insanity for so long. I didn't know much besides the fact that my best thinking was exactly what got me to the bottom I was currently sitting at. That bottom consisted of an aggravated DUI, a child endangerment charge, CPS involvement, losing my license and jeopardizing my job at the company I had worked at for 7 years...just to name a few. Life, as I had known it, was never going to be the same.



So I started. I started listening and I heard my story. I started showing up and I found my people. I started praying and discovered God right where I had left Him many years ago. I started working The Steps and I felt lighter. I started being honest and I found forgiveness. I started being grateful and suddenly what I had was enough.

Today I have gone through the steps, in their entirety, 3 times with the help of my sponsor and 2 step study groups I have participated in. Starting the program of Alcoholics Anonymous was without a doubt the most important decision I could have made 2 years ago. Today, the most important thing I can do as a member of Alcoholics Anonymous is to "continue".

Step 10 says we "Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it". Step 10 challenges me to continue on with the work that I chose to start when I became a member of Alcoholics Anonymous a little over 2 years ago. The 12 & 12 talks about how, for almost all of us, pain had been the

price of admission into our new lives. If I am working Step 10 properly and doing an honest nightly inventory, I have a pretty good chance of staying ahead of the kind of the self-inflicted pain that consumed my life in the past.

Today I don't have to wait until I reach an agonizing and humiliating "bottom" to apologize, to correct my behaviors or to honestly appraise my character defects. Instead, I can curl up on the couch with a blanket and a notebook, in the comfort of my home, while my daughter drifts off to sleep in her bedroom down the hall. It is in those moments that I can humbly meet my Higher Power and continue on my journey to know God and His will for me.



AREA 26 NEWS

FROM OUR DELEGATE

Hi guys, my name is Jennifer, and I am an alcoholic. Serving as your Area 26 Delegate. Thank you to Districts 6,14,18,21,32 for hosting this weekend's Assembly. On August 16, 2023, we had our first ever General Service Conference Sharing Session. This was because of a Conference advisory action to have at least 2 conference-wide online sharing sessions throughout the year. A full report from this meeting was sent via email. Some information may be touched on in this report.

On Saturday, August 26, 2023, I had the opportunity to participate in a Traditions Workshop, hosted by District 16. We had a wonderful turnout and a chili cook-off really set the day up for success.

I attended and participated in two picnics this quarter in which I gave my story. The first one was the Bill W. Picnic on September 9, 2023, at Yellow Creek Park in Owensboro, KY. The second was the 64th Friends of Bill Picnic, hosted by District 7, on September 10, 2023. It was a busy weekend but would not have missed it for the world.

On October 2, 2023, I met for the last time with the Conference Corrections Committee. It was bittersweet. Basically, fair wells were given to the 72 Delegates.

I also attended a training session on October 4, 2023, regarding On Board, the new platform that will be used for Board, General Service Conference, and World Service meetings beginning in October with the distribution of General Service Conference information. On October 5, 2023, I attended A South East Region Special Gathering Trending Topics with Tom H. our South East Regional Trustee. This gathering was focused on a sharing session to help clarify some of the current topics circulating around the Region. The invite was limited to Delegates, Alternate Delegates, Delegate- Elects, Alternate Delegate-Elects, Past Delegates and Past Trustees of the Southeast Region to enable enough time for everyone to share their questions, concerns, and observations.

The digital version of the Final Conference Report has been made available and this weekend the print version is being handed out. For the first time, an anonymity-protected version is on the aa.org website.

A reforecast budget was approved at the latest board weekend. YTD contributions are slightly above the YTD budget. The YTD gross literature sales are also above the budgeted amount and are greatly above last year's sales currently, this is because of an increase in sales in March before the April price increase, and strong sales in June. Cost of goods sold is still high, at around 48% of gross sales, but the costs are becoming more stable. Our YTD total operating expenses are over budget so far, as the cost for traveling expenses has been higher than expected. The reserve fund balance is approx. 12.5 mil, which is a little over 7 months' worth of expenses. Our operating cash has been steadying every month from January until now, and it is 13,000 less than at the beginning of the year, so almost even. We have .37 months' worth of operating expenses in cash.

The Translations Licensing Connection virtual portal has been very successful with 50 international service structures using it to request and communicate about licenses to use our literature. It began with a backlog of nearly 1000 requests and using the portal and two temporary workers, it is 76% cleared and is expected to be up to date in the next 45 days.

The first 164 pages of the Big Book are being translated into Haitian Creole by an ad hoc committee. An active group in Haiti will participate in the reviewing process of the translation.

New "Editorial Project Manager" position created:

This coordinator role has been restructured to include more specifics regarding project management and provides focus on continuous accounting of all publishing items including development of new items and changes to existing items. Currently, 85 titles are not in distribution or backordered, however, 44 of these have been either approved to print or are active in the reprint/revision process and will be back in distribution in approximately 30 days. The remaining 41 are under review by Staff or Publishing dept. to determine next steps. Hopefully, this will improve the large number of backordered items.

The board currently has 10 applications for Board chair and are following the normal procedure for filling that vacancy. They are also hiring a consultant to help them in their search.

Don't forget to book your flights and hotel for SSAASA coming up in November in Orlando. SSAASA (Southern States Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly) will be held November 17th-19th in Orlando FL. This event facilitates sharing sessions, panel discussions, and shared service experience between AA members & amp; trusted servants. All AA members are welcome to attend to find out more about our Third Legacy – Service!

Lastly, thank you for allowing me to be of service to Area 26. This is my last Area Assembly holding a position. I was Chairperson prior to being elected Delegate and feel it's time for rotation. I attended my Districts picnic last weekend and was not on the agenda and was like.....this is what it feels like. It felt nice. I look forward to sitting in the back of the room and watching the growth. Speaking of growth, Area 26 has come a long way these past two years and I want to thank each of you that has played a part. Don't forget to dance in the rain while growing.


